Please remember that we are partners in your children's education and we need to work together to ensure your children have a happy and successful year!

Sheree Fitch: On October 18, all of our KA students were treated to 3 wonderful sessions with children's writer, Sheree Fitch. It was a great day! Sheree talked about how she became an author, read from her books, gave writing tips and told us lots of stories and read us lots of tongue twisters and poems. Thank you to the Knowlton Literary Festival for funding the majority of her day! It was a very, very special day!

Dance: Weekly classes for Levels 4 – Sec. 1 have started this week on Monday's led by Heather Croghan and will go for 17 weeks. It will conclude with a dance show on February 28 in the afternoon.

Village Reads: Our Village Reads program has started. Thank you to our community members who read with and mentor our students on a weekly basis. Thank you to Sheila Perry for running the program once again this year.

Violin Lessons: Lessons are underway with a total of 3 groups and 29 students. Advanced on Tuesday's, Beginners on Wednesday's and Intermediate on Thursday's.

Robotics: Our Robotics Program will start shortly with the onset of the cold weather. Thank you to Jeff Page for continuing to run the program this year. With all our new Robotics and coding equipment, classes will be using it all as well to make learning at KA even more exciting.

Lockdown: In accordance with the ETSB Safe Schools Policy and with your children's safety and security foremost in our minds, we will be having our first practice lockdown in November with the SQ present. This will be a planned lockdown and the students will be well prepared for it so it should not be a traumatic experience. The lockdown should take about an hour from start to finish. You can help by discussing it with your child beforehand, as well. I wish we lived in a world where we didn't have to practice such things as lockdowns! Last year, our lockdowns went very well with very minimal anxiety. Thank you for your support in this matter. We will let you know when we have our first one scheduled.

Fire Drills: On Tuesday, October 22, we had our third fire drill. Everyone was out of the building in 2 minutes and 4 seconds! Well done! The fire department also spent a day in classes on October 25 talking about fire safety. Smoke detectors went home with all new students. Please go over the evacuation plan that your child received and return it to school by November 11. Members of the Fire Department will pick from these plans to choose a student for 'Fireman for a Day' and will join them at the Fire Department on a date to be decided.

Attendance and Dismissal: Please call the school at 450-243-6187 and leave a message when your child is going to be absent or late. It is School Board Policy to follow-up on all absences. If you do not call the school, we will have to call you and this can be a very time consuming task. Also, **please send in** notes with your child for any special arrangements concerning lunch or pickup. Messages to the office cannot always be forwarded to the teachers during the day as it disturbs their classroom teaching and students and teachers are not always in their homeroom. All changes in your child's dismissal procedure must be sent by note with the student that morning. Please make sure your child is aware of the change, as well. If you are changing the Daycare for that day, you must send a note to the teacher and inform the daycare as well. (450-242-1336, leave a phone message.) Please understand that your child's safety is our first priority. With 230 students at dismissal, it is crucial that we know where everyone is going. For that reason, no changes will be made during the day unless it is a true emergency. If we are not sure of where your child is to go, we will send him/her to the office and then to daycare if necessary, at which point they will need to be picked up. Please keep dismissal changes to a minimum. Notify the office of any change in contact information. It must always be up to date. For changes in bus transportation, please use the form provided by transportation. Thank you for your understanding and help in this matter!

Lost and Found: Our Lost and Found area is being reworked thanks to our PPO. Please come and check regularly for lost items. **Please mark all items with your child's name.** Any blue 'uniform items' without a name will be washed and put in our uniform room and sold. All else will be bagged up and given away after Parents Night on November 20 and at the end of Term 2 and 3.

Facebook, Internet, Messaging Use: This is a yearly reminder to please monitor your child's messaging (chat). For example, although NO child under 13 should have their own Facebook page, I am well aware that this is NOT the reality. That being said, cyber-bullying is an ever-growing problem and a very serious and dangerous one. It is up to you as parents to know and monitor what your child is doing and/or if anything hurtful is happening to them, or they are participating in conversations or acts which will do others emotional damage. Remember that, in Quebec, there is a law against bullying and cyber-bullying. Thank you for your co-operation in this very serious matter. Students that use their ipads inappropriately

will have consequences including the loss of their device both in and out of school (when they do go home). The Cycle 3 and Secondary 1 classes are all having digital citizenship classes which includes cyber-bullying awareness. This year, our younger students will also learn about digital citizenship.

Lice Update: Please make sure you check your children regularly at home and contact the school if any eggs, nits or live lice are found and do all necessary treatments.

Dear Parents,

Every year many students and staff become ill and lose days at school because of illness. By following some simple hand washing and other preventative measures, we can reduce the number of people getting sick from the cold and flu.

The best defense against the spread of germs is the awareness of proper and effective hygiene both at school and at home.

Here are some ways to protect your family:

- Keep children who are sick at home. Don't send them to school.
- Teach your children to wash hands often with soap and water for 20 seconds. Be sure to set a good example by doing this yourself.
- Teach your children to cover coughs and sneezes with tissues or by coughing into the inside of the elbow. Be sure to set a good example by doing this yourself.
- Teach your children to stay at least three feet away from people who are sick.
- People who are sick should stay home from school and avoid other people until they are better.

If used, these simple, yet very important, preventative actions will reduce the occurrence of illness in our schools. The common cold, the flu and 'the gastro' germs must be transmitted from one person to the next in order for illness to spread. If we all make an extra effort during this time of unusually high presence of these germs in our schools to prevent the spread, we can then feel confident that we have really reduced their negative effect.
